He made his mark in Texas caving history by spending over 200 days in Midnight Cave in 1972 as part of such a study by NASA.

Michel wrote several books on caves, his experiments, and his interests in cave use by the ancient Maya. I will miss him. *George Veni*

for Roanoke City Parks and Rec for over 20 years) led the way and went over the basics of cave safety and conservation. We worked as a team and did lots of aggressive spotting and helping each other along the dicey spots.

At the "step across", Marian and Nick stayed down in the creek to spot each person from below as they stepped across from one ledge to the other. Eve-

> ryone, including Helene, did it perfectly! We worked our way back to a few more climbs and slides; making sure no one slid off the slippery sloped ledge into the creek. Helene, MarySue and Barry elected to turn around and start working their way back; making their way down the "butt -crack" slide to avoid the "step across". Nick, Ben, and Marian made sure they all made it safely, and then continued on to the back of the cave to see the natural spring.

They stopped to take a picture of Nick at "crocodile rock" and to see the passage-way where the cave bear bones were found decades ago by Fred Grady. After a brief rest and refreshment break at the spring (the water was low, but still a pretty pool), they took the "canyon passage" back to the entrance. The goal was to avoid falling into the water; no one made the big splash.

They caught up with the rest of the group who had been fortunate to see a bat (what we used to call a "pip" (pipistrelle) but now it's called a tricolor), and a beautiful cave salamander. After some "after" photos of us muddy in all our smiling glory, and picking up a garbage bag full of trash, we had a delicious lunch in Eagle Rock at the "Iron and Oar." It is family owned, huge servings for very reasonable prices, and friendly staff.

Lone Ash Cave #2 (aka Bertha Cave)

August 24, 2024

<u>Cavers</u>: Susan Burr, Doug Feller, Jeff & Hillary Huffman, Kelly Perkins, Nick Schmalenberger & Lauren Appel.

This trip was set up through the New River Trail State Park at Foster Falls, VA.

We were led by 2 interpretive rangers Lee & Bret, who drove us in the park van to the entrance. The cave is about 3.5 miles from the park next to the trail.

The cave sits up the hillside a short distance. The entrance is gated. You stoop walk through the gate & first short passage and come into a big room. There are a few formations in this room & in some tiny pools of water we saw some type of very tiny cave shrimp. We also saw several spiders & their egg sacs.

We first ventured off downhill to the right a very short distance to that end of the cave. Once we checked it out, we headed back up to the big room & then headed up to the left side. Midway, Lee pointed out the "Turtle" & "Dragon" formations. Continuing further up we got to the "Tongue" formation. That was



my favorite. From here we climbed a short wooden ladder & then using a knotted rope climbed to the area above the "Tongue" formation. This was our end point for the trip. We were not allowed to go any further per the park rules

After getting a few pictures we carefully got back down to the main big room & out the entrance.

It was definitely one of the smallest caves I have ever been in! We were in

the van longer than the cave trip I felt like. Lee did give us some fun facts & pointed out some sights about the park, the old railroad, furnaces, etc.

Once back to the park & changed we went to the river to check it out. Nick cooled off a little while there by getting his feet wet.

Grotto Trip Log

March – May 2024: caving in Mexico – reports by Rolland Moore.

6/22: Island Ford Cave, VA. Participants included Susan Burr, Doug Feller, Kelly Perkins, Margo Soucek & Calvin Long. Margo may have seen a "rare salamander. Calvin fell but no injuries. Susan was glad it wasn't Doug!

7/1-5: Sewanee, TN. NSS Convention — Nick Schmalenberger went caving during Convention in the Widow's Crack, Crystal Cave, Bible Springs, Adair Pit, and "No Cave." Dave and Mary Sue went caving in The Caverns (Big Mouth Cave, TN).

7/10: Dressler Cave, VA. Participants included David Socky, Joe Zokaites, Rick Lambert, and Jim Schurman. Rick, Joe, and I surveyed this whole cave while Jim kept watch at the surface. The down climb that I had left turned out to be pretty easy to climb down and just as easy to climb out again. It did bell out a little at the bottom, but not bad. The lower level ended up ending, except for one lead that was blowing a little bit of air. A tight 4" constriction hole opened up within a half-foot, so a couple of straws would open the way up. The passage past the constriction looked like hands and knees and about 2 to 3 feet wide. Looked good! Need to return to this. We surveyed 268 feet in about 3 hours.

7/10: Go Slow Cave, VA. Participants included David Socky, Joe Zokaites, Rick Lambert, and Jim Schurman. This was a little cave right on the side of Rt 220. An easy belly crawl going in and then the floor sloped down so you could stand up just inside. There was a floor channel. After 17 feet there was a slot in the floor which you couldn't fit into, but it looked like it opened up below. There was trash down below which had washed in. The drop was about 10 to 12 feet, maybe a little less. It looked good sized, but there was no air flow.

7/10: Rushing Waters Cave, VA. Participants included David Socky, Joe Zokaites,

Rick Lambert, and Jim Schurman. Joe and Dave went in to check the data logger and the second sump. The data logger was still in the water, but we moved it so it was a little deeper in the flowing water. The second sump was pretty much at the same level as when Dave was there last, but the water was clearer. Dave went in up to his neck and could see into the sump. The passage sloped downwards and looked to be 3 feet high by 3 to 4 feet wide. Dave couldn't see any back wall and it looked to keep going down. A promising dive.

7/17: Grape Arbor Pit, VA. Participants included David Socky, Joe Zokaites, Bill Koerschner, Jason Sargent, Tom McIntyre, Keith Sweeney, Rick Lambert, and Tom Whitehurst. Joe, Bill, Sarge, Tom McIntire, and Dave did all the digging. Rick, Keith, Tom W, and Sarge (for a little) put data loggers in Collins Cave and Rodent Hotel Cave on the hillside. They then did geology stuff. Dave did one 9-inch straw and then the drill broke. But the one straw did a good number and we spent the rest of the afternoon digging out the spoils and digging down. There didn't seem to be any air movement, but it must have been sucking a little because it was hot at the bottom and the smoke from the blast was gone almost immediately. Bill was down in the hole when a thunderstorm roiled in and it started to rain. We got halfway down the hill before the rain started in earnest. We got soaked, but it only lasted for 1/2 hour and then the sun came back out. We then went over to look at Triplet Cave.

7/17: Triplet Cave, VA. Participants included David Socky, Joe Zokaites, Bill Koerschner, Jason Sargent, Tom McIntyre, and Keith Sweeney. Sarge and Dave went in to look at the dig face. The cave is about 60 feet long now with two rooms (spaces) in which you can stand up. The floor is gravel and small rock and diggable. Might need to widen the passage after which we'll be able to see if it gets bigger or not. It was cold and blowing a little air. Bill really likes this dig!

7/12-13: CaveSim in Roanoke, VA (Washington Park & Wasena Park) – Dave

& Mary Sue Socky, Marian McConnell, Kelly Perkins, Nick Schmalenberger, Doug Feller, Susan Burr, and Carl Cornett volunteered and participated. All loved it and so did the kids!

7/16: La Pech Merle in France – Abbey Mays and Alexander Koch visited while in central France. Commercial trip; no photos allowed. They did see cave paintings 29,000 years old.

7/20: McClungs, WV – Nick Schmalenberger, Kelly Perkins, Logan Van Hon, Dave Socky, Ben nln – enjoyed the 5-hour trip, went in the historic entrance.

7/21: Patton's, WV — Nick Schmalenberger went with Greenbrier Grotto.

7/27: Sunny Jim Sea Cave, San Diego, CA – Commercial cave Nick Schmalenberger went into with his Mom and Dad. Had about 200 stairs.

8/3: Bone Norman Cave, WV — Pick up trip with Lauren Appel (Mystik wasn't feeling well), Brian Williams, Riley nln, Susan Burr to the pinch.

8/24: McClung Cave, WV. Participants included David Socky, Paul Walko, Eli Meyer, Nick Socky, Gracie Cornish, Nikki Fox, Jason Delafield, Laurel Molloy, and Andy Bui.

8-24-2024: John and Lyn Pearson visited Rock City, Lookout Mountain, TN. See seven states. Took multiple trails through boulders, canyons and crevices. Ended with a trip through Fairyland Caverns, which depicts every imaginable Fairy Tale you've ever heard. I had forgotten all about 'Jack Sprat', for instance.

8-25-2024: John and Lyn Pearson visited Ruby Falls, Lookout Mountain, Tennessee. Took the 10 AM tour and beat the rush. Literally four tour groups of 20-40 people came after us while we were exiting the cave. Well lit, easy to traverse cave of approximately ½ mile of passage to get to the falls. Virginia has much prettier commercial caves. Waterfall was worth it though.
